Minnesota Opera 2018-2019 Season Features Two 21st Century Works

Lineup includes a world premiere, the homecoming of the Pulitzer Prize-winning Minnesota Opera commission *Silent Night* and three operas new to Minnesota Opera audiences.

MINNEAPOLIS (February 20, 2018) – Minnesota Opera today announced its 2018-2019 season, building upon the company's reputation as a champion of new work with the presentation of two Minnesota Opera commissions while also continuing to reinvent the classics in innovative ways.

The season features five productions at the Ordway Center for the Performing Arts. Puccini's *La Rondine*, a rarely performed romantic and nostalgic treasure, opens the season in October. In November, homecoming performances of the Pulitzer Prize-winning opera *Silent Night* honor the centennial of World War I's conclusion. In January of 2019, the uproarious comedy *The Italian Straw Hat* comes to the stage bringing plenty of laughs and bright, breezy music. The season continues in March with the world premiere of *The Fix*, an opera based on the notorious Black Sox scandal of 1919. And finally, Verdi's beloved *La Traviata* returns to the stage in May, boasting sumptuous, hummable melodies.

"We are excited to announce Minnesota Opera's 2018-19 season," said Minnesota Opera President and General Director Ryan Taylor. "Opera has the unique power to celebrate our common humanity and to create a powerful bond between artists, audience and community. This season exemplifies Minnesota Opera's continued commitment to excellence and storytelling that resonates with our audiences. By bringing innovative creative teams, a mix of classics and contemporary compositions, and some of the world's most exciting singers to Minnesota, we are expanding what opera can be to our community. We invite everyone to join us for what promises to be a bold and moving season."

The 18-19 season marks the return of several artists familiar to Minnesota Opera audiences, in addition to noteworthy debuts. Irish soprano Celine Byrne makes her debut as Magda in *La Rondine*, alongside tenor Leonard Capalbo (*The Elixir of Love*, 2015). *Silent Night* brings the return of the Karin Wolverton, who created the leading soprano role of Anna Sørensen, and baritone Edward Parks (*La Bohème*, 2016). Lyric tenor Miles Mykkanen joins them as Nikolaus Sprink, the beloved German opera singer. Alek Shrader (*Diana's Garden*, 2016) stars in the hilarious story of *The Italian Straw Hat*. Joshua Dennis (*Rigoletto*, 2017) leads the cast as legendary White Sox player "Shoeless" Joe Jackson in *The Fix. La Traviata* marks the return of Minnesota Opera favorite and 2005 BBC Cardiff Singer of the World winner Nicole Cabell (*La Bohème*, 2016) and Mexican tenor Jesús León, in his company debut, as the ill-fated lovers of Verdi's classic tragedy.

Which Life Would You Choose? From the composer of *Madama Butterfly* and *La Bohème*, this rarely performed gem tells the story of an unlikely relationship between Magda, a high-society woman and a naïve, handsome poet. But the fate of their courtship is uncertain as Magda is torn between the life she wants and the life she knows. Puccini's achingly beautiful score charmingly conveys the romantic bliss and irrational desires of unexpected lovers. Wistful and nostalgic, *La Rondine* revels in the gaiety of Paris, the stinging sorrow of regret and the sensual richness of love.

All Is Calm, All Is Bright. Minnesota Opera's Pulitzer Prize-winning, international sensation makes its homecoming, honoring the centennial of World War I's conclusion. Recounting a miraculous moment of peace during one of the bloodiest wars in human history, Scottish, French, and German officers defy their superiors and negotiate a Christmas Eve truce. Silent Night masterfully weaves together songs from home and serene lyricism, standing as a heartfelt hymn to our common humanity, underscoring yearning, despair and ultimately, hope.

Groom-to-be Fadinard gallops around Paris on his wedding day in search of a straw hat to replace the one his horse has inadvertently eaten. The bright and breezy score perfectly captures the increasingly ridiculous situation that rides on the edge of chaos. After seeing this 1950s madcap romp, you'll never look at a hat—or a night at the opera—the same way again!

With a lyrical, poetic score and legendary figures such as Shoeless Joe Jackson, Ring Lardner and Judge Kenesaw Mountain Landis, *The Fix* is a tale of epic proportions about betting against the establishment, all set against the backdrop of America's favorite pastime.
